

## Hello Church,

It has been a blessing to be able to connect with you through social media during these unprecedented times in our world. We are grateful for the technology that allows us to stream our services to you. However, as great as that has been it does not take the place of gathering together as the body of Christ. We are thrilled to announce that we will reopen our church doors on Sunday, May 17th! We will have morning worship at 10:30 a.m. At this time, that is the only "in person" service we will offer. Live streaming will continue on Sunday mornings, evenings and Wednesday nights.

We know that many of you have questions and concerns about this. We promise to take as many precautions as possible to keep everyone safe. First and foremost, if you feel like it is too soon to meet together, please stay home! Although masks and gloves are not required, please feel free to take all the precautions you would like to protect yourself and others. We want to protect our church family. That is why we will continue to offer live streaming of the services. You can still be a part of worship but in the safety of your home.

Following the "Governor's Heath Protocols" released on April 27th, we will ask that proper social distancing be followed. In order to accommodate the space required by six-foot social distancing, it will be necessary for us to reduce the number of people in attendance for worship service. It is important to note that each person in attendance will be personally responsible for maintaining a safe distance in all directions between himself and others in attendance.

We ask that **you** follow these guidelines to protect yourself and those around you:

- We strongly encourage at risk populations to watch the service remotely.
- Please do not attend the service if you or anyone in your immediate family has any symptoms of Covid-19.
- A maximum of 75 people will be allowed to enter the Sanctuary. Overflow seating in the gym will be provided with video screen viewing.
- in the dismissal process.
- be a desire to shake hands or hug, but we must avoid physical contact a while longer.
- tain social distancing guidelines in these areas.
- Offering plates will be located near exit points.

Below are guidelines and health protocols that we will be following:

- knobs, tables, chairs and restrooms.
- Hand sanitizer and soap and water will be readily available at multiple locations.

This is the plan for now. We will all need to be very flexible, and we appreciate your patience. As we are able to increase our attendance or offer more services we will let you know. We are very excited to once again offer an on-site worship service. See you Sunday, May 17th at 10:30 a.m.!!

A Page from Jim's Journal

I found myself in a bit of a predicament last Sunday morning right before we live streamed the service. About thirty minutes before the service started, I got out of my car on the church office side to get some quick last-minute tasks done and I spilled my water bottle in my lap in the process. It looked awful, like I couldn't make it to the bathroom and wet my pants. This is usually when I wake up and breathe a sigh of relief, knowing it was just a dream. Unfortunately, it was real, and I began to think of quick fixes before I had to walk into the sanctuary with wet pants.

I wish I could report that I found a way to turbo dry my pants or was able to cover up the embarrassing wet marks. But I just didn't have the time. I decided to just walk in and announce "I poured water all over my pants, I did not wet myself!" After the initial 5 seconds of embarrassment had worn off, it was done. I had stressed for fifteen minutes trying to cover up what had happened, and prevent people from thinking I had an accident. Almost immediately, the truth relieved me of my embarrassment and shame.

I'm willing to assume most of you can relate to this scenario. Maybe you didn't pour a bottle of water down the front of your pants, but you can remember a time when you tried to fix an embarrassing or shameful situation without simply coming out and stating the truth. Though the situation I described is comical, I regret being able to say I've done this too many times in my walk with Christ. It's really easy to fall into the trap of "keeping up appearances." I don't know why we do it, but it seems as Christians we do anything to make sure people don't think we are struggling or hurting. Like if someone knew we weren't perfect it makes us less than a child of God. But we aren't perfect, Christ died because no one is perfect.

This situation makes me think of John 3:19-21. It says, "And this is the judgment: the light has come into the world, and people loved the darkness rather than the light because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his works should be exposed. But whoever does what is true comes to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that his works have been carried out in God." Do you feel stuck in a negative cycle? Are you trapped in a secret sin that you so desperately want out of? Stop stressing and working so hard to hide in the darkness. There is freedom in the light. It is somewhat painful at first, but freedom follows. There is a reason James said in 5:16 "Therefore confess your sins to one another and pray for each other so that you may be healed." There is freedom in the light, there is freedom in Christ.
