
It is likely that you read through the "what He expects from us" piece quickly. Would you go back and read that again – slowly – and think about each of the phrases? What would it look like if these pieces all began to be fully manifest among us? It makes my heart beat fast just to think about it.

In some ways, all of these are already happening. In other ways, we are still some distance away from their full realization. How do we get from where we are now to where God would call us? One of the first steps happens in our hearts and in our imaginations. This step involves having a vision of where He is taking us as a church. A vision is a mental image, a clear and powerful picture that pulses in our brains, a constant "dream" that is shared by all and passionately desired by the whole church family. Jesus seemed to share His vision in Luke 19:10 when He said, "for the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which was lost." This vision drove His life. It took Him to a cross. It was compelling.

We are not finished with this discussion. We will talk more about it in the near future. In the meantime, be praying about what kind of vision God will give us – and you!

Many years ago, a Moscow theater put on a satirical and sacrilegious play called "Christ in a Tuxedo." At one point, the actor who played Jesus, Alexander Rostovzev, was supposed to recite a few lines of the Sermon on the Mount, remove his gown, and cry out, "Give me my tuxedo and top hat!" But as he began reading the words from Matthew 5:3-4, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted," he was moved to continue reading, ignoring coughs, calls, and the foot-stamping of his fellow actors. When he had read several verses, he recalled a verse he had learned during his childhood in the Russian Orthodox Church. He cried out from Luke 23:42, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

Rostovzev trusted Christ as his Savior on the stage that day! And whether it is the apostle Paul on the road to Damascus, Zacchaeus up in the sycamore tree, or Jonah in the belly of a great fish, the Lord meets each of us in unique ways. Maybe you know someone to-day you consider too far gone to ever come to the Lord. Maybe you have been praying for one of the names on our church's prayer list. The next Christ encounter for that person may be just around the corner. So never stop praying and having hope. You never know where Jesus will meet someone! Think of a few lost people you know and pray for them right now. Pray that God, in His way and in His timing, would reveal Himself to them and give them His free gift of salvation. And never stop praying!

This last Wednesday we hosted an annual outreach event that we have put on every year called B.A.R.F. Day. B.A.R.F. stands for "Bring A Real Friend". The students team up for a gross games competition and try to win the coveted Iron Stomach Award.

We started the night out by reading from Matthew 7:13-14. It says, "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that leads to life, and those who find it are few." I then told the students about Zacchaeus from Luke 19, who found no peace in his riches.
