A Page from Jim's Journal

God doesn't need me. Shane Pruitt words this best in the beginning of a blog post he wrote back in 2014. He says, "Every single one of us carries a bit of a savior complex in us, and we all love the idea that someone else needs us. Often, we long for the moments where the "bat signal" goes up and we can swoop in with our cape on to save the day. There are even times, where I believe that I'm so awesome, that the Creator of the universe needs my help to accomplish His will! I like the idea of thinking that God somehow needs me. The problem with believing this, of course, is that a "need" implies a lack of something. So, if God were to need me, then that means that He must lack something in some way. And by definition, if God is lacking in anything, then He is not God."

I got a good reminder of this the Wednesday before school let out for Thanksgiving break. I have spent every Wednesday going through the gospel of Mark with teenagers. We started with John the Baptist, and we are now in the final week of Jesus' life. We read the scripture together, I explain it, and we talk about how that applies in their context. A lot of times I'll put them in small groups and let them discuss what it looks like to follow a particular passage in their every-day lives. In this context I can fall into the trap of putting a little too much emphasis on my preparation, my teaching, and my communication. But none of those things can actually transform a heart. Only Jesus can convict and transform, leading to new life.

This particular Wednesday night, before Thanksgiving break, the students went through several different prayer stations, equipped only with a bible and the elements at each station. The purpose was for them to see what it's like to spend some time individually reading the bible and learning how and what to pray for. I had no involvement aside from setting up the prayer stations. The fruit of that time was evident. Several students came out of that time in tears, all were encouraged, and we had a young lady give her life to Jesus. I was blown away. God had moved and I had nothing to do with it. I sat there with so much joy in my heart. I realized that sometimes I just need to get out of the way. God is at work, and He doesn't need me!

Now here is a an even greater piece of news. No, God doesn't need me. But He wants me. Galatians 4:4-7 says, "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth His Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. And because you are sons, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" So, you are no longer a slave, but a son, and if a son, then an heir through God" What a beautiful reminder of the truth that God wants me! He wants us so badly that He was willing to go to any length to redeem us. According to these verses, redemption means that I was once a slave. In fact, I was a slave to sin. There was a ransom or price tag on my head that had to be paid in order to set me free. The price tag was death. Jesus paid that price for my ransom to grant me freedom by dying on the cross, and the resurrection was my receipt that the payment was accepted. I have been set free by the blood of Jesus, and there is nothing more valuable than that. That fact alone places extreme value on my life! **Because of Jesus, I am worth something!** Because I am worth something, I am invited to take part in His Kingdom work. What an amazing God we serve!
